Dear municipal leader:

I am writing to formally invite you and your city to join other groups in celebrating Missouri Good Neighbor Week (Sept. 28-Oct. 4). Neighborhoods USA recognized Missouri Good Neighbor Week as the best neighboring program in the United States in 2023!

Last year we had nearly 20,000 acts of neighboring performed and reported during Missouri Good Neighbor Week. We were also able to recognize/reward and tell the stories of 12 engaged neighbors in Missouri and highlight some of the best acts of neighboring.

New this year is an effort to recognize the most neighborly cities in Missouri. We will recognize four cities based on size categories provided by the Missouri Municipal League. The recognition is based on participation in Missouri Good Neighbor Week by your residents. The four cities recognized will receive a digital "badge" that can be used on newsletters, letterhead, social media, etc., and a plaque delivered during a council meeting. There will also be media coverage of the award and the honored cities.

Since Missouri first proclaimed this official week, we have seen it become an impactful annual program to recognize great neighbors in our respective communities. When people think about and show kindness toward neighbors they become more likely to volunteer and to serve.

There is an additional reason to embrace and encourage the celebration of this week in your community. A Nextdoor study showed people who know six or more of their neighbors have decreased levels of social isolation and loneliness compared to people who do not. By stepping out of your home and connecting with neighbors through a neighborhood gathering or act of kindness, you are helping to build a social support system in your neighborhood. This is an effort that benefits your city which is why we believe Missouri Good Neighbor Week is worthy of your support.

Recognition of great neighbors provides tangible examples for others to follow and highlights leaders of all ages who are engaged neighbors. It is important to remember that this grassroots community and leadership development effort is the starting point for good neighbors, not the finish line.

New for Municipalities This Year:

Earn Status as Most Neighborly City in Missouri

Determine and recognize the most Neighborly Cities in Missouri based on four size categories (provided by the Missouri Municipal League). Points are assigned to communities based on:

- reported acts of neighboring from that community during Missouri Good Neighbor Week,
- the number of engaged neighbor nominations submitted,
- points for a local Good Neighbor Week proclamations reported,
- and bonus points for any winning acts of neighboring or winning engaged neighbor nominations.

Encourage your residents to do an act of neighboring and then report it via the Missouri Good Neighbor Week website! Ten of the top acts in Missouri will be recognized and those efforts help your city too. The award categories are: Small City, with population under 5,000; Medium City, with population 5,000 – 15,000; Large City, with population 15,000 -30,000; and Metro City, with population more than 30,000. Winning cities will be announced nationwide, receive a plaque at a council meeting and also receive a digital badge for use on newsletters, websites and social media.

Nominations for Engaged Neighbors Open All Year

The statewide recognition of Missouri's Most Engaged Neighbor as part of Missouri Good Neighbor Week (Sept. 28 to Oct. 4) is being expanded this year with **nominations accepted all year online at http://missourigoodneighborweek.com**. We heard from participants and nominators this year that the week came and went, and they did not get nominations submitted. So, instead of creating a barrier to nominations, we want to open the process to collect names all year. Then we will recognize the winning nominations during Missouri Good Neighbor Week. During Missouri Good Neighbor Week in 2023, 62 people were nominated for recognition. Each of them received an acknowledgment letter and gift by mail. Twelve were selected for the statewide honor and received an award certificate and prize check. These statewide awards are provided by University of Missouri Extension and The Hopeful Neighborhood Project, which sponsors Missouri Good Neighbor Week.

New Partnership with Habitat for Humanity in Missouri

A partnership with the Habitat for Humanity organizations across Missouri is a new addition. We hope to raise awareness of Habitat for Humanity's mission, develop new volunteers and perhaps raise funds. Our official partnership statement reads as follows: "Local Missouri Habitat for Humanities are partnering with Missouri Good Neighbor Week to repair, rebuild and restore communities around Missouri. Celebrate the week by volunteering or working with your local Habitat for Humanity, or doing events that raise funds for local efforts. More Information

Missouri's Governor signed legislation HB1738 on July 1, 2022, establishing Missouri Good Neighbor Week. The week begins on Sept. 28, also National Good Neighbor Day (first created in 1978 by President Jimmy Carter). Missouri Good Neighbor Week was selected as the best neighboring program in the United States for 2023 by Neighborhoods USA.

Suggested Steps to Celebrate Missouri Good Neighbor Week in Your Own Neighborhood

visit the Missouri Good Neighbor week website and nominate someone as the most engaged neighbor in your community. Winners will be selected and recognized during the week of celebration.
your community. Winners win be selected and recognized daring the week of celebration.
Get local sponsors or funding for local prizes to recognize top acts of neighboring and the "Most Engaged Neighbor" in your town or county. (We recommend \$250 for top awards but leave it up to the local contact.)
MU Extension and The Hopeful Neighborhood Project will do statewide promotion and offer statewide prizes for neighbor nominations. But your efforts to promote the week locally make a difference.
Prepare a city or county proclamation for Missouri Good Neighbor Week as part of your local promotional effort. An example proclamation is included in this packet.
The goal is to encourage more acts of neighboring and to foster discussion about what it means to be an engaged neighbor. Let this special week be the start of an ongoing effort in the fall to promote neighboring.
Talk to members of your household about a way to connect with your eight closest neighbors. It could be a front yard cookout, or delivering cookies, or just beverages and cookies on the driveway. The report what you did online at https://www.missourigoodneighborweek.com/ so your city gets credit!
Visit the Missouri Good Neighbor Week website and download our list of 101 acts of neighboring.
Pick a date for your event that is during Missouri Good Neighbor Week (Sept. 28 to Oct. 4) and send out invitations to your neighbors or hang an invite on their door.
Plan and host your event. And remember to have a good time! You are not responsible for entertaining people. The goal is to build connections!
Report your successful event and the outcome (number who attended and impact) on the Missouri Good Neighbor Week website (missourigoodneighborweek.com) or the websites of the week sponsors.
There will be random drawings among those who submit what they did with or for their neighbors. But better yet, these submissions from across Missouri will help create a database of unique neighboring ideas! Reporting your activity directly ties to the long-term success of this event.

You don't have to stop at just one event. Deliver a gift to your neighbors, host a get-together of some sort, or even organize a neighborhood parade. We have an entire week to celebrate!

WHEREAS, one recent study showed that people who know six or more of their neighbors have decreased levels of social isolation and loneliness compared to people who do not;

WHEREAS, research shows that developing positive neighbor relationships positively impacts mental health, life expectancy, and physical health for individuals;

WHEREAS, research shows that developing positive neighbor relationships positively impacts disaster response, civic engagement, crime prevention, and economic resilience for entire communities;

WHEREAS developing positive relationships means stepping out of your home and connecting with neighbors who can help build a social support system in your neighborhood;

WHEREAS, neighboring is an opportunity to be thankful for those living nearest us, a chance to be a blessing or generous, and an opportunity also to receive;

WHEREAS, good neighbors help to create good neighborhoods and vibrant communities; and
